

Ira Aldridge 60

Birth:

Born in 1807 in New York City.

Early Years:

Aldridge gained his first professional acting experience with the African Company, who founded the first resident African-American Theatre in the United States. Frustrated with the lack of roles given to black actors in the United States, Aldridge moved to London, where he settled in Upper Norwood, Southwark.

Achievements:

Aldridge was best known for his Shakespearean roles. He regularly performed in London and embarked on a European tour. He was especially popular in Russia, where he became acquainted with famous artists such as Count Fyodor Tolstoy and Mikhail Schepkin. He performed title roles in King Lear, Othello, Richard III and the Merchant of Venice. He is the only actor of African-American descent among 33 actors honoured with bronze plaques at the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre in Stratford upon Avon.

Death:

Aldridge died in 1867. A blue plaque now commemorates his home on 5 Hamlet Road, Upper Norwood, Southwark.
